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ABOUT THE AUTHOR

A.D. Lyall writes speculative fiction. He loves fantasy for the complex worlds it contains, science fiction for glimpses into possible futures, and horror – especially dystopian horror – for how it can reveal the human condition within terrible circumstances. A graduate of RMIT University's Professional Writing and Editing course, A.D. Lyall has worked as a copy and manuscript editor, and has significant experience as an executive within the not-for-profit sector. He has been published in a number of speculative fiction magazines, including Aurealis, and lives in Yarraville, Melbourne.

WHAT DREW YOU TO WRITING THE LAST TO GO?

I started writing *The Last to Go* for lovers of the zombie apocalypse (which includes me – I'm already set up to survive when it comes). I've always had a thing for horror stories set in cornfields, and having been in the Mossman Valley around the time I started writing the book, I liked the idea of using sugarcane fields instead, setting my story in the Australian tropics. I find scarecrows oddly disturbing, and I enjoyed playing with the zombie genre and making my creatures somewhat different to how they're usually portrayed – this gave birth to the 'crows.

My stories are usually about relationships and how they grow or falter and sometimes collapse, so it quickly changed from an action-oriented tale to one in which the horror sits in the background. And I wanted the horror to be closer to home, not just something that comes from "monsters".

I also wanted to explore an urban (or rural, as the story turned out) version of the lcarus myth, and to subvert it. Hence Rus came about, and Charlie developed to give him balance. I was equally keen to explore the concept of *otherness*, especially being in a place from which you can't escape, but also being other within mainstream society (not sure if there's a difference).

Adam was originally destined for a different fate, but he was always a strange representation of Daedalus – not in the Freudian sense – just in terms of what he signifies; the one who gives wings to Icarus. As Adam developed, I enjoyed his inherent danger, and the conflict he causes by just being him. Adam was the opposite of Charlie, he was alpha to Charlton's omega, at numerous levels; Adam was dominant in personality, he was an apex predator, the start of the end, while Charlie represented completion, self-actualisation and (spoiler alert) the last man alive, but not in a literal sense. Rus was the nexus between the two, the character most at risk of *burning*, but the one who could shine brightest in the right conditions.

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
